

**MINUTES OF THE ASCENSION ISLAND COUNCIL (AIC)**

**MEETING HELD IN THE COURT HOUSE,**

**Monday, 27<sup>th</sup> June 2016 at 13:30hrs**

**1. Introductions**

The Administrator began by saying that the meeting was quite significant as it was the last scheduled formal meeting of the Council. Members had been in office since the 2013 Elections and Council would be dissolved on 2 August. The Administrator said that he had enjoyed working with elected members; Council had worked through some difficult times and he acknowledged the positive difference that members input made to the quality of work that AIG did. One of the examples of this partnership was the work that was happening to reopen the Georgetown Bakery. This was an issue that was not on the Council agenda at the time, but by working with councillors and the electorate it looked like this would come to fruition soon. There were some issues that still needed to be resolved, including the future of the air link, fisheries and employment law (it was hoped that the employment law would be progressed by the new HR Director during the next electoral cycle).

In addressing the Council the Governor said that this was her second meeting with Council and she was amazed at how different the agendas for the two islands were which she felt reflected how different the two islands were. The Governor said that she was looking forward to coming to Ascension to meet councillors in person as this would help her to understand the issues.

The Administrator opened the floor to councillors for comment. Cllr John reflected on previous discussions in which it sometimes felt that democracy wasn't working; however, in fairness he felt that a lot of progress had been made in the last three years. It was a joint effort between AIG, members of the Council and the Governor's office and locally, he felt that democracy and partnership was working.

**2. Confirmation of Minutes**

The minutes of the Island Council meeting held on 31 May 2016 were adopted without amendment and would be published on the AIG website ([www.ascension-island.gov.ac](http://www.ascension-island.gov.ac)).

**3. Matters Arising**

**3.1. Policing**

Cllr Arms-Lawrence addressed a comment made by Cllr Yon at the last formal meeting and clarified that the discussion that was held in a previous informal meeting was triggered by concerns raised by members of the public regarding the approach of police officers when carrying out their duties. Cllr Yon

was happy with the clarification and confirmed that she had been approached by members of the public who were pleased that the police were taking a proactive approach in community policing. The Administrator confirmed that the Chief of Police, Trevor Botting, had met with the team to discuss their methods and approach and would be visiting the island in late July.

### 3.2. Youde case

Cllr Leo said that as a result of the appeal on behalf of the Youde family, the Governor had made a decision which allowed the Youde family to remain on Ascension for an additional four months. Cllr Leo said that he was disappointed with the decision as he believed that under the circumstances, the family should have been granted the full support they required to retain their livelihood on Ascension and maintain their plans over the next two years. The Governor confirmed that she had nothing further to add to her decision.

Cllr Leo concluded by saying that the Youde family had given him permission to use their son's story in the interest of reviewing and correcting the relevant legislation; however, they were grateful to the Governor for allowing them to stay on island for an additional period.

The Administrator said that the decision was not an easy one as there was a clear legal framework to work within. The family had been given additional time to make the necessary arrangements for their return to St Helena. The Governor's team and the Social Worker were working to ensure a smooth transition.

## 4. Airlink Update

The Administrator introduced the subject by saying that the people on Ascension were grateful for the extension of the RMS until September. The Independent recently published a lot of information on air access (edition published 24 June 2016) and this was widely read by the public; however, the Administrator asked the Governor to give Council an update.

In her last update that she gave Council, the Governor had told Council that SHG was looking for an interim service; a plane that was capable of flying in and could cope with the tail winds on the second runway. Meanwhile, the Governor said that wind data was being collected on the main runway – this would enable the bigger planes which Comair have to land. This data will not be ready to enable Comair to operate before 2017.

In the meantime, however, SHG was looking to see if there was an interim solution – several options had been submitted and were being considered, and in its last edition the Independent published one of the interim solutions. The problem that SHG was finding was that this was the start of the northern hemisphere summer holidays and it was difficult to find a plane that was available during this period.

SHG hoped to make an announcement soon on interim measures for access to the islands, as the Governor was aware of the public's need to plan and have certainty with future arrangements.

Cllr Leo said that he hoped that good news could be made public as soon as possible as the people on Ascension were getting frustrated at not being able to plan as in many cases people needed to plan months in advance. The Governor agreed with Cllr Leo. When asked about a timeframe for an announcement, she said that ideally within the week, but following the referendum on 23 June and the turmoil in the UK she was unsure when an announcement could be made. The Governor confirmed that the interim solution would include Ascension.

**Council would wait for the Governor's announcement on future travel arrangements and would ensure that the message was circulated to the public promptly.**

Cllr Leo enquired about the Airlink Agreement which had been circulated to elected members; he wanted to know if this formed part of the update to members. The Administrator explained that he sent

it to members for their information; and in response to Cllr Leo's question why councillors were not consulted on the formulation of the agreement the Administrator said that it was an agreement between the governments of the United Kingdom and the United States and was an interim agreement while the terms of the Wideawake Agreement were negotiated. Cllr Leo was interested to know whether the discussions on the costs and conditions took into consideration that the US Government occupied a vast amount of land on island but did not pay property tax. The Administrator said that the focus of the Airlink Agreement was quite narrow to enable a plane from St Helena to land on Ascension and for Wideawake airfield to be used as a divert option for flights to St Helena. Cllr Leo stated that local taxes were being by-passed by the US Govt and the Council should have been involved in the decision for this reason alone. The Administrator said that the US Govt was aware of the issues and were a part of the wider debate on the future of Ascension. The Airlink Agreement had been the priority to have the permissions in place which would allow a plane to land on Ascension.

## **5. Public Holiday: ratification of Proclamation declaring 4 July a holiday**

The SG explained that prior to the meeting Council had advised the Governor via email that they were happy for the Governor to declare the 4 July to be a public holiday in accordance with the Public Holidays Ordinance. The Proclamation was issued on 15 June and Council was now asked to formally ratify their advice for the purpose of the minutes.

Cllr John asked the Administrator whether companies had offered their thoughts on the decision. The Administrator said that initially companies were enthusiastic about the holiday, but were less enthusiastic when it became clear that this was not the final sailing of the RMS. There would be cost implications for companies; however, there were various activities for residents, including a party on Sunday 3 July, to celebrate the ship and its crew.

**All five councillors who were present were happy to confirm their advice to the Governor to declare Monday, 4 July 2016 to be observed as a public holiday on Ascension to celebrate the service of the RMS St Helena over the last 26 years and to recognise its importance to Ascension Island.**

The Administrator said that in order to accommodate the preparations for the weekend's programme staff had had to work hard during the last few days to make sure that logistical arrangements were in place to get the crew ashore so that they too, could come to the party.

## **6. Fisheries Update**

The Director of Conservation and Fisheries, Dr Judith Brown, said that the debate regarding reopening the commercial fishery/having an MPA had dominated the Council agenda over the last year and she wanted to provide the Governor and members with an update on fisheries and conservation in general.

Following the UK decision for Ascension to only open 50% of its zone to commercial fishing (with a 50% closed area) in October 2015, AIG hosted a scientific workshop (in April 2016) to establish the research priorities needed to inform the placement of the final Marine Protected Area (MPA) and to evaluate its long-term effectiveness. The workshop was attended by 29 leading marine scientists, conservations and policy makers.

During the last licensing period only two fishing vessels registered. Dr Brown said that the vessels fished in the Ascension zone for a period of 31 and 34 days respectively. The next licensing round would commence in August 2016. Data obtained from the satellite surveillance project indicated a high level of apparent compliance with the Ascension Island EFZ (Exclusive Fishing Zone) regulations.

Dr Brown told Council that a new donor had shown interest in funding a further £300k of marine scientific research on Ascension. The funding is in addition to the £300k which the UK Govt will

provide for marine protection and enforcement.

Closer to home, work on the inshore fishing regulations was continuing and would be brought to the next Council. The work had highlighted the need to protect shark species around Ascension, which were vulnerable to overfishing due to low reproduction rates. This led to a proposal by Conservation to add all shark species to the schedule of protected species under the Wildlife Protection Ordinance.

Finally Dr Brown was pleased to report that the Biosecurity Report had been completed. The recommendations from the consultant's report would be addressed by the new Terrestrial Conservation officer. The report would be made available to the Council prior to their next meeting.

Cllr Yon asked whether in view of recent events in the UK<sup>1</sup> whether the UK Govt funding was ring-fenced and if it would be affected by future events and the probability of a general election in the UK. Dr Brown stated that the Blue Belt initiative was a manifesto commitment (of all major parties) and it seemed unlikely that the NGO's would allow the government to renege on their agreements – she would check with the Foreign Office about this.

In ending Dr Brown thanked the Council for their support during their term in office to both fisheries and conservation on Ascension.

## 7. Hydroponics Update

The hydroponics project was up and running and the first crops had been harvested and made available via the local shops. The official opening of the site was taking place later that day. The Administrator said that the project was a good example of being able to deliver on a project that benefitted the whole island.

Councillors were given sight of the proposed costs for the produce; the Administrator said that the costs just about covered the overheads and were affordable to the public. AIG had negotiated with local shops to keep their mark-up as low as possible. Initially the project would produce baby leaf salad, lettuce, pak choi, tomatoes, cucumbers etc. Over the previous weekend there had been two successful open days and over 150 people visited the site.

Cllr Yon said that she visited the site over the weekend and was very impressed with it; she wasn't sure what to expect, but the speed with which everything grew was quite impressive and the layout was good. A positive off-shoot from the project had been the encouragement by the consultant who had set up and masterminded the project, Stephen Herron, for local people to get involved which boded well for the future sustainability of the project.

Cllr Leo said that he had also been visiting the site and following the progress of the project and he acknowledged Stephen's hard work that he put into getting the site up and running. Cllr Leo hoped that the future would prove that all his work would not have been in vain.

The Administrator echoed Cllr Leo's sentiments and said that AIG had brought in an experienced site manager who would take the project forward and hopefully train up others to ensure the sustainability of the operation.

Cllr John asked about the arrangements between the shop and the site; he said that it would not be helpful to the shop if they placed their orders for produce but found that people were buying directly from the site. The Administrator confirmed that no produce would be sold from the site and everyone was encouraged to buy through the main supermarkets.

**The Administrator agreed to send the Governor some photos so that she could publicise the project via social media; an article would also be published in the Islander.**

## **8. Pier/Infrastructure**

With the support of FCO, the Government was managing projects to upgrade the pier and other infrastructure projects. The projects were still in their early stages; a tender process would be undertaken in the coming months to get a consultancy report on the requirements for the projects. In the meantime Users were in the process of submitting their requirements which would inform the outcome of the report.

Cllr Leo asked about the two MOD plans which had been submitted recently in respect of the Pier Head; to which the Administrator informed council that these would form part of the documents which would be submitted to the consultants. The Administrator confirmed that the Tender Board would make the final decision, but that the consultant would be seeking the advice of the local workforce and residents in their research.

This was a long-term project over 3 – 4 years that would require support from FCO and would be spearheaded by the Policy Officer on island.

## **9. Crèche Proposal**

The Administrator said that when the new regulations for Child-minding were brought in recently there was concern that some child-minders had stopped offering their services and there was a perceived gap in the provision of local childcare. Cllr George made some initial enquiries about setting up a privately-run crèche although she has not formally submitted a proposal. In the meantime AIG had also looked at setting up a government-run crèche however, when the Social Worker Rob Parfrey looked into this he found that there was not adequate demand to warrant the need for a crèche. Having spoken to parents, most of them had managed to make adequate provision for childcare and more recently another child-minder had registered her interest in offering child-minding services.

The Administrator said that for now AIG had paused its work on providing a crèche and would hear from Cllr George (on her return from leave) whether she wanted to continue with her private sector proposal. The Administrator explained to the Governor that currently children were looked after by registered child-minders in their homes.

## **10. Falklands Safeguarding roadmap**

This item was first introduced in November 2015 in preparation for the JMC (Joint Ministerial Council) and was an initiative from the Falkland Islands for all of the British Overseas Territories to sign up to a roadmap to best practice in child safeguarding in all of the territories. St Helena was about to sign up to the roadmap and it was a good opportunity for council to advise the Governor that Ascension also wished to sign up. The council was cautioned about some of the commitments of the roadmap and the relevance to Ascension. By comparison St Helena had greater resources and a more 'normal' community than Ascension.

The advice from Council to the Governor was that Ascension would sign up to the roadmap but would include a caveat that recognised the unique political and/or resource constraints that might prevent the Government from fulfilling all the obligations and commitments of the agreement.

**All 5 councillors present agreed with the caveat and recommended that Ascension should sign up to the roadmap.**

Action: the SG to email the Governor with the terms of the caveat to include in her letter of acceptance on behalf of the territory

## 11. Business proposal: the Rock Shop

Council had received a proposal from Mrs Elaine Arms who was applying to operate a gift shop from the premises in Georgetown known as the Rock Shop. The proposal was to sell souvenirs and gifts from the South Atlantic islands as well as offering tea, coffee etc. The business would be geared towards tourists. Councillors were generally content with the business proposal; however, Cllr Yon referred to a question raised at the informal meeting on 24 June about the proposed bakery. Cllr Yon wondered if the bakery was still going ahead as Mrs Arms and her husband were also planning to re-open the bakery in Georgetown.

The Director of Resources, Jamie Manson, said that the bakery was still going ahead, however, there had been a delay from the supplier of the control panels. DoR was pleased to advise that the panels should have arrived on the RMS which called at Ascension the previous day and would be installed soon. Once the units were installed and minor remedial works were completed Mr and Mrs Arms would be able to move in and get up and running soon.

### **All 5 councillors were in favour of the business proposal in respect of the Rock Shop**

Action: to formally commission the installation of units and clean up of bakery. The clerk would inform Mrs Arms that the application was approved and prepare the necessary paperwork.

## 12. The Future of Ascension (Cllr Cyril Leo)

Cllr Leo circulated a paper entitled 'The Future of Ascension – Memorandum 3' to members prior to the meeting. He opened his presentation by saying that in the 2012 White Paper<sup>2</sup> the Prime Minister declared "(this) Government is as ambitious for our territories as we are for the United Kingdom".

Cllr Leo went on to say that the UK is responsible for 14 Overseas Territories, one of which is the territory of St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha. The White Paper clearly stated that each territory had a unique community and it was for the territory to shape the future of its own community. Cllr Leo said that the paper went on to say that the vision for the territories was to have vibrant and flourishing communities. In his letter of 24 December 2015, Cllr Leo had said that Minister Duddridge had pointed out the significance of working within the one territory principle as the future of Ascension is addressed.

Cllr Leo said that he could not accept that when requested by elected members the three councils of the territories were not able to officially acquaint each other through council to collectively decide on matters that are of common importance. As a result of this confusion and the need for clarity Cllr Leo said that he was tabling the memo so that the electorate could be properly informed by the Governor before the next General Election. The decision sought was based on the UK's One Territory principle specifically emphasised by the Minister in reference to the 2012 White Paper.

Cllr Leo's memorandum sought answers to the following questions in preparation for the next General Election on Ascension:

1. To provide the Electorate with clarification on the current status and the role and remit of elected representatives according to the South Atlantic Territories Constitution and the Island Government (Ascension) Ordinance in relation to democracy, elected representation and the good governance on Ascension.
2. To inform the Electorate if elected members are officially an integral part of the Ascension Island Government or just attached to the Council to serve as advisors to the Governor on demand.

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3. To inform the Electorate if the UK Government will permit elected representation on Ascension to progress from advisory to legislative function.

The Governor thanked Cllr Leo for the memo, which she only received earlier in the day and as such had not had a chance to consider a response. Her initial response was that the powers of the council were as described in the Constitution; in order to make laws Council was a part of the legislative process. The Governor saw the Council as playing an important role in this process as she relied on the Council's advice as she was not on the island – she used the morning's discussions as an example of the value of the advice that councillors gave to her. The Governor was aware of councillors concerns regarding the future of Ascension, and advised that the decisions will come out of the discussions on the island's infrastructure.

In his response to the Governor's initial advice, Cllr Leo reiterated his expectations that in preparation for the General Election that the electorate were informed of the role and remit of the Island Council and that the Governor would clarify what the UK Government's intentions were in regard to the Council moving from an advisory body to a legislative body. With regards the importance of the role of the Council in its advisory capacity Cllr Leo said that over the years he had enough experience of how elected representation in its advisory form was not good enough to carry forward the progress for the people in as far as political, social and economic advancement was concerned.

For her research the Governor said that over the last few years Council had passed 16 laws, which she did not think was indicative of a body that could not take forward the social and economic development of an island.

Cllr John referred to the Constitution which was a tool for the Councils of Ascension, St Helena (and Tristan da Cunha) to work with. He acknowledged the recent failing when a decision by the Ascension Island Council to have a full fishery was overruled by the Minister in favour of an MPA/Fishery partnership. Cllr John said that perhaps what Cllr Leo was asking for was a change in the Constitution to suit Ascension. The Administrator told members that the question of changing the constitution was a matter for the UK Government.

Cllr Leo gave a further example when in the last year he asked for a review of the Land and Business Policy. This, he said, was a piece of legislation that needed to be reviewed and improved so that there were options and opportunities for local taxpayers. In the end the policy was reviewed by AIG without consulting members of the Council.

The Administrator explained that the Land and Business Policy was introduced in 2008 following the Right of Abode decision and in 2015 AIG carried out a light touch revision of the policy without changing the underlying principles of the policy. The work that the Government carried out on the policy was a technical update and only a few minor adjustments were made e.g. to ensure the policy referred to businesses still in operation on the island.

**It was decided that the past minutes would be reviewed to ascertain what exactly was requested and agreed. The Administrator undertook to send the Governor a copy of the policy along with the relevant documents.**

Cllr Leo suggested that the policy should be brought back to Council again and reviewed properly. The SG explained that although the policy was not reviewed at the time the document had been updated to make it current. The work that was carried out looked at the mechanics of the policy – there was no intention not to consult Council. The update occurred at the same time that Council requested a review of the wider policy to look at giving people better property rights and might have seemed at cross purposes with what Council originally intended.

Cllr Leo explained that if a private individual were to invest in a property on the island, under the current policy it was not possible to sell the property or to bequeath it to a family member, it had to be returned or given (if a new build) to the Government or destroyed. This was one of the areas that Cllr Leo wanted

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to be reviewed - it was not a request to look at right of abode, although he agreed with the SG that the two issues were inextricably linked.

The SG advised that when the update of the policy took place in 2015, he did not believe there had been a decision to review to original 2008 Policy, which would have been a significant exercise and not something that was undertaken in 2015

Cllr Yon asked whether the new Council could request a review of the policy. She referred to recent suggestions that one of the Council committees could have a remit for Tourism and Development. Having a tourism industry on island would inevitably mean that there would be a requirement for more small businesses. Cllr Yon went on say that the Government was asking people to invest their own money into the island, for the benefit of the island, but it was difficult for them to get a return on their money especially if they used their own money to do up property. Cllr Yon also referred to the future of Ascension discussions which were dependent upon the outcome of the Pier Head and Infrastructure projects and the lack of external funding which was available to Ascension. The Land and Business policy in its present form was not designed to attract new investors. Cllr Yon said her initial view of the Future of Ascension discussions was that it would address these issues, however, the current line of direction of consultants and tender processes seemed to be deflecting the real discussion.

In concluding his comments on the discussion, Cllr Leo said that one of the reasons for asking for the initial review (in 2015) was that in a group discussion with constituents the question came up about building a small place that could be rented to tourists. The policy as it stands does not allow this but Cllr Leo said that he would seek a review.

The Administrator said that he could see both Cllr Leo's and Cllr Yon's points of view and what they wanted to achieve, i.e., a property situation akin to St Helena and other parts of the world. At the moment the current UK Govt policy was that everything is owned by the Crown and by looking at property rights Council would be challenging the status quo on right of abode. The two are linked and it is difficult to make a concession on one without overturning UK Govt policy on the other. However, the discussions on the pier and the infrastructure would likely lead to the discussions that Cllr Leo was requesting on the future of Ascension.

Cllr Yon recognised the difficulties, however, she asked the SG whether there was an opportunity to review the legislation to provide for extended leases still with property rights linked to the ability to be on the island, i.e., employment contracts which would not bestow right of abode further to generations down the line. The SG said that currently there was scope within the policy for some Land Occupancy Permits for commercial enterprises to be granted for a number of years (i.e., 20 years in cases) which would give businesses assurances for their investments.

In summing up the Administrator said that the discussion on who financed the pier and infrastructure projects would open up the discussion on the island's future; the sums of money required would force the argument. The Governor reiterated these comments.

Cllr Leo ended by saying that he hoped that the Governor would read his memorandum and respond accordingly, especially in light of the lengthy and quite useful debate which Council had enjoyed. The Governor concurred and said that she relied on Council to advise her and to give her direction.

### 13. Any Other Business

#### 13.1. Two Boats School (Cllr Yon)

Cllr Yon referred to the presentation by the consultant Head Teacher, Keith Sedgwick, to Council at their informal meeting on 24 June. Cllr Yon said that she wished to express her thanks formally

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to Mr Sedgwick for the work that he had done since he arrived. The school was much improved and the atmosphere was happier and it was a more welcoming place. In addition the pupils were doing well and the teaching staff were happier. He had done a very good job and he was leaving the school in a good position. The Administrator seconded Cllr Yon's comments.

### **13.2. Cllr Ellick's MBE (Cllr Yon)**

Cllr Yon offered her congratulations to Cllr Ellick on her investiture which took place at Buckingham Palace on 22 June. These sentiments were also shared by all present.

### **13.3. Governor Phillips' approach (Cllr Leo)**

Cllr Leo took the opportunity to acknowledge the new approach that Governor Phillips had brought to the territory with her personal touch to ensure that people felt valued and the efforts she was making to keep people informed. Cllr Leo said that the Governor's inclusive approach was creating real hope for the territory. The residents of Ascension were skilful, creative and resourceful and he hoped that under Governor Phillips their true potential would be realised and utilised to the full and allowed to thrive in the best interests of Ascension and the residents. In reference to the UK's White Paper on the OTs Cllr Leo said that the people of Ascension did have the potential to create a flourishing community and as the future of Ascension is addressed he hoped that this would mean democratic, political, social and economic advancement for the people.

The Governor thanked Cllr Leo for his words.

In her closing comments the Governor said that she was looking forward to coming to Ascension to meet everyone. She said that she was trying a new approach which was based on social media and inclusivity and she welcomed councillors' feedback. Governor Phillips reiterated that she needed the advice that Council provided to her in her role.

The meeting finished at 15:25pm.

## ANNEX A

At Council on 25 June you presented a memo which requested that I answer three questions about the status of the Island Council. I have considered your questions and my responses are below. I am happy for you to share these with your constituents.

**1. Governor to provide Electorate clarification of the current status and the role and the remit of elected representatives according to the South Atlantic Territories Constitution and the Island Government (Ascension) Ordinance in relation to Democracy, elected representation and the good governance on Ascension.**

The Island Council provides an important and key function supporting the Governor in ensuring that Ascension Island is governed in accordance with the partnership principles set out in the Constitution and ensuring the good governance of Ascension. It performs this function as an advisory council, advising the Governor on the formulation of government policy and also in its advisory role in the legislative process, advising the Governor on new legislation. The Council's powers are set out in the [2009 Constitution](#) and the [Island Government \(Ascension\) Ordinance 2008](#).

**2. Governor to inform Electorate if elected members are officially an integral part of the Ascension Island Government or just attached to Council to serve as advisors to the Governor on demand.**

As set out in the [2009 Constitution](#) and the [Island Government \(Ascension\) Ordinance 2008](#), the Island Council is an integral part of the executive function of the Ascension Island Government, advising the Governor when she is formulating policy.

**3. Governor to inform Electorate if the UK Government will permit elected representation on Ascension to progress from advisory to legislative function.**

No, there are currently no plans to change the advisory powers of the Island Council as set out in the [2009 Constitution](#) and the [Island Government \(Ascension\) Ordinance 2008](#).
